MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 6, 2026, PARKS COMMISSION MEETING
CITY OF DAYTON, MINNESOTA

CALL TO ORDER

Pikal called the City of Dayton Parks Commission meeting to order for January 6, 2026.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Motion by Chambers, seconded by Cole, to approve the proposed agenda.

Motion carried unanimously.

CONSENT AGENDA

A. Approval of Park Commission Minutes from November 5th, 2025

Motion by Senst, seconded by Cole, to approve the Parks Commission minutes from November 5, 2025. Motion carried unanimously.

OPEN FORUM

No participants were present for online public forum.

COUNCIL UPDATE

Salonek provided updates from the previous meetings.

Farrell announced that Elizabeth had a baby on December 30th - a boy named Theodore, weighing 9 pounds 11 ounces.

REGULAR MEETING

B. Council Adopted Capital Improvement Plan

Farrell presented the approved Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) to the Commission. Key park-related items discussed included:

Fund 404: Replacement of park garbage cans (\$15,000/year through 2029), park signage and rebranding, tree nursery near Public Works, Diamond Lake Diamonds improvements (2026-2029).

Fund 405: Community park land acquisition (\$150,000), Sundance park Phase 2, Elsie Stephens Phase 1 (\$1,750,000 for bandshell and parking), future community park development.

Fund 406: Playground replacements per 25-year lifecycle.

Fund 408 (Trails): Water trails at Historic Village (DNR-funded), Goodin Park improvements with Three Rivers Park District, various trail projects through 2029.

The Commission also reviewed the parks equipment replacement schedule and current cash balances across the various park funds.

C. Parks Needs Study RFP

Sevald presented a proposal for a parks needs study that would inventory existing sports facilities used by Dayton residents, even those outside city boundaries. The

study would analyze facilities used by athletic associations serving Dayton residents across Champlin, Rogers, and Maple Grove to identify gaps and needs.

The Commission discussed the value of taking a regional approach to understand what facilities are being used by Dayton residents and what future needs might be based on population projections. This would prevent the city from investing in facilities that duplicate what is already available nearby.

After discussion about cost concerns versus long-term planning benefits, the Commission voted to approve moving forward with the RFP with a maximum budget of \$30,000.

Motion by Senst, seconded by Chambers, to set a maximum budget of \$30,000 for the parks needs study. Motion carried 3-2 (Lingard and Pikal opposed).

Due to precinct caucus requirements on February 3rd, the Commission agreed to reschedule the next meeting to February 4th, 2026.

POLICY DECISION / ACTION TO BE CONSIDERED: Discuss Phase 1 from accepted revised Master Plan

BACKGROUND: The Master Plan for Elsie Stephens Park was an effort developed between 2016 and 2018, with Staff, Council, Contract Landscape Architects, and a Steering Committee. The project was refined over several meetings and with input from all of the participants at the various stages of development. The City is currently in Phase 3 of the development of the Park, with various elements being installed including, trails and river overlooks, landscaping, bridges, performance area with seating and power, patio, decorative lighting, and trail link into Cloquet Overlook Park, part of the Three Rivers Park District Mississippi Regional Trail.

The City Council has requested that future phases be identified along with costs and an approximate timeline for the additional phases. Staff recommended an update of the Master Plan, and conducted an RFP requesting proposal documents from interested Landscape Architects. Staff received 6 proposals, and reviewed each of them for compliance to the RFP and reduced the contenders to 3 finalists for Park Commission to Interview.

City Council Awarded the Contract for the project to MSA at their regular council meeting on 02-25-2025. Since contract award MSA has conducted meetings and data gathering from Staff, Community representatives, Commission & Council representatives, and residents. MSA presented initial Concepts based on the direction given. Concepts were presented at the 9-2-2025 Park Commission meeting for review and comments.

Subsequent to the 9-2-2025 concept presentation, further refinements have been included based on feedback received, we are close to the final version of the concept and are not anticipating major changes to the Concept.

At their 10-07-25 regular meeting, Park Commission reviewed the master plan concept and voted unanimously to recommend the Council adopt the master plan concept.

The master plan was presented to the City Council at the 10-21-2025 meeting, where after discussion the plan was adopted without the phasing suggestions or costings, to provide flexibility in the future development of the Park.

Staff has worked with MSA to refine Councils request for Phase 3 of Elsie Stephens Park development, the Council identified 4 items for inclusion, Bathrooms, Splash Pad, Performance stage improvements, additional parking. A budget of \$1,500,000 was suggested for these improvements. The concept plans for Phase 3 have been reimagined and cost estimated for the project at \$2,025,000, Staff are looking for direction from the Council of how to proceed with Phase 3 of Park Development.

Staff presented phase 3 plans to City Council at the 1-27-2026 regular council meeting, to get direction on how to proceed with phase 3. After much discussion Council gave direction to proceed with refining design and tightening up the budget numbers for the performance area to include a metal cover for the stage, that has a wood liner and stage lighting built in, the design of the structure should be similar to the wave structure shown in the examples given in the presentation. The council did not have any interest in extending the seating area, but would like to add a concrete dance floor in front of the stage. There was also discussion regarding the general contractor for the project.

Council requested more information on the splash pad and the bathroom. Staff will be coming back with a recommendation on the type of system to be installed (whether a well, or Municipal utilities) whether a flow through system or a recirculating system. Explore the possibility to reuse water for irrigation in the park, which would require installation of an irrigation system in the location of the splash pad. The stormwater system would have to be extended to provide storage for the water reuse.

Council would like the splash pad and bathroom and the performance area to be completed this year if possible, but priority should be put on the performance area, to be ready for the June 6th concert with a scheduled event in the park.

PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

MSA understands that the City of Dayton has allocated approximately \$1,500,000 for the development of the first phase of the Elsie Stephens Park Masterplan. The City Council has requested elements for the first phase to include elements from Phase A of the Masterplan such as the splashpad and associated utilities, bathrooms, and parking, as well as elements from Phase B of the Masterplan such as expanding the existing performance area to include a dance floor, and a cover for the stage. The area identified in the master plan for the splash pad is to the west of the park entrance drive, adjacent to the two silos, and is currently vegetated with a mixture of trees, shrubs, and mowed turf. There are currently no water, stormwater, or sanitary utility lines to the park. We understand the Council wishes to see the identified work come to fruition expediently. To assist the City in this endeavor, MSA has prepared a preliminary concept for the above work hereafter referred to as Phase A and an associated cost estimate.

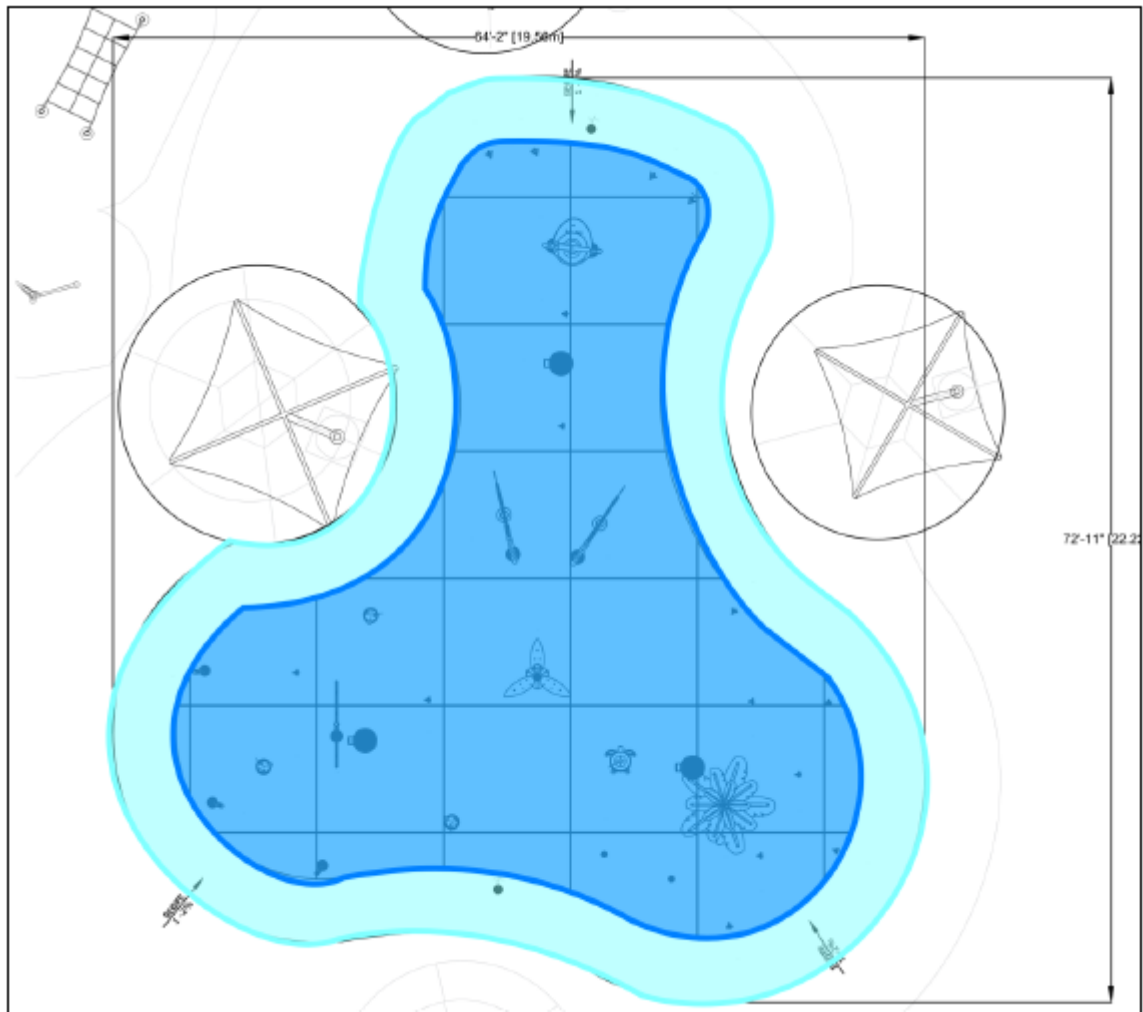


Figure 5 - Plan view of 3,800 sq ft splashpad at Legends Park in Reedsburg WI

POLICY DECISION / ACTION TO BE CONSIDERED: None.

BACKGROUND: Staff would like guidance from the Park Commissions on their goals for 2026 specifically, and longer-term projects for consideration.

Park Improvement projects from 2025 status update.

Dayton Farms Park, sport court seal and painting, complete sport court hardware installation, irrigation system completion, tree installation, final completion walk through and acceptance of project.

Ione Gardens, landscaping improvements completed, additional trees installed, final completion walk through and acceptance of project.

Elsie Stephens Canoe/Kayak Launch, design, permitting and bid documentation completed.

DNR boat landing reconfiguration, this project is at the Design and planning stage.

Elsie Stephens Master Plan Update, Master Plan is completed and accepted by the City Council.

Irrigation projects, Elsie Stephens Park, River Hills play area, Hayden Hills, Ione Gardens and Sundance Woods, all of the irrigation system installations are complete, we have a Spring start up and acceptance of the projects to complete in 2026.

Replacement trash receptacles, receptacles have been purchased to replace the existing ones at Cloquet Park, these will be replaced in Spring of 2026.

Park Improvement projects 2026

Trash and recycling containers replace/installation, Central Park

Install play equipment boxes, these boxes were funded from a grant with HCYSG, they will contain equipment appropriate to the park that they are located in, anticipated located. Anticipated locations, Central, Riversbend, Sundance Woods, Hayden Hills, River Hills.

Elsie Stephens Park Phase 3, this project is being coordinated currently based on Council direction. Currently at design refinement, need to get required permits and complete bid documentation for Bid and build in 2026.

Elsie Stephens Park entry, there is funding allocated for signage at the entrance to the Park.

Elsie Stephens Canoe/Kayak, bid opening in February 2026 for construction in the Summer of 2026.

DNR boat landing reconfiguration, design refinement, bid documentation and permitting expecting to be completed in 2026 with construction in 2027.

Territorial Road/Rush Creek Parkway trail connection, trail connection design, bid and construction 2026.

Current fund balances, Park Dedication \$2,908,909 of this \$1,300,000 is reserved for the community Park, and \$1,500,000 is reserved for Elsie Stephens Phase 3 leaving a balance of \$108,909. Trail Dedication \$3,155,047 balance.

CRITICAL ISSUES: Aligns with Council goal to “Maintain and Enhance the Natural and Rural Community Connection”.
